6 family reach.





- Boston-based family of four
- Father working full-time, mother working part-time
- Parents are college graduates and homeowners
- 18-month-old son diagnosed with stage IV neuroblastoma
- 6-month-old son

Treatment details

The severity of diagnosis required full-time medical attention and treatment at hospitals in both Boston and New York City.



250 total days spent in-patient/at day clinic



5 surgeries over the course of 1 year



Multiple infection-based procedures



Daily cranial radiation sessions



Continuous chemotherapy



6 trips to New York over 7 weeks

Financial expenses during treatment

Below is a breakdown of expenses accumulated during the family's journey through one year of cancer treatment.

PRE-DIAGNOSIS

\$135,000 Father's full-time salary

\$75,000 Mother's part-time salary, carried primary insurance policy

\$210,000 TOTAL PRE-DIAGNOSIS HOUSEHOLD INCOME

POST-DIAGNOSIS

-\$75,000 Mother resigns to care for her son

-\$58,828 Additional expenses during cancer treatment

\$76,175 TOTAL POST-DIAGNOSIS HOUSEHOLD INCOME

INCLUDING THE CANCER EXPENSES, THIS FAMILY LOST 64% OF THEIR HOUSEHOLD INCOME.

EXPENSES

COBRA PAYMENT: \$1,200/month -\$14,400

CHILDCARE: \$500/week -\$26,000

Sibling required full-time care due to extensive hospital stays

PARKING: \$8.00/visit -\$2,600

In-patient/out-patient dual-parent/family visits

PHARMACY: OUT-OF-POCKET COSTS -\$1,100

TRANSPORTATION

Medical mileage, lodging, gas -\$12,928

CO-PAYS

Physical therapy, home health care -\$1,800

TOTAL EXPENSES INCURRED: \$58,828
